Important Equipment:

Eye protection

All shooters and other persons on or in the immediate vicinity of the firing line, including coaches, range officials and any spectators must wear adequate eye protection (glasses or goggles). The equipment must protect both eyes. Eye protection must be kept on until all shooting has ceased and the firing line has been made safe. Eye protection is mandatory for all shooting disciplines with the exception of archery, where eye protection is encouraged.

Ear protection

Adequate ear protection is required for all shooters participating in activities and events with the exception of Archery, BB gun, or air pistol/rifle events where they may be worn at the shooter's option. Hearing protection may consist of either appropriate plugs or headphones or a combination of both.

An Adult must accompany any shooter under the age of 18.


Actions must be open and out until you are on your station and ready to shoot.

Texas 4-H Congress

Texas 4-H Congress is a four-day mock legislative experience for 4-H members in grades 9th to 12th (at the time of the event). During this time, 4-H members assume the roles of legislators, lobbyists, and press corps to gain a first-hand understanding of how the legislative process works. Bills that are written and sponsored by 4-H members focus on issues concerning Texas and Texas youth. These bills are assigned to the appropriate committee, debated in committee meetings, and then on the floor of the House or Senate. If a bill is successful in negotiation and the legislative debate in all three stages, it is delivered to the Governor of Texas 4-H Congress for his or her signature or veto. Copies of all the bills that are signed into law during Texas 4-H Congress are provided to the Office of the Governor for review. Contact your County Extension Agent for additional information.



The Youth Agricultural Lifetime Leadership opportunity is a 6 day exploration for youth to experience South Texas agricultural production. During the South Texas Y.A.L.L. Experience, youth will get to see many unique agriculture operations. Youth will see shrimp and sugarcane processing plants as well as various cattle operations. While many youth are interested in some aspect of agriculture production for a career, many are unfamiliar with all of the job opportunities that exist in commercial agriculture production. Tour attendees will also be challenged in a variety of ways to improve on their leadership skills as agriculture spokespersons. Participants will see how numerous agricultural related issues are challenged on a daily basis by groups targeting our food supply system. Participants will be provided opportunities to defend agricultural related topics based off of the information they learn from the tour presenters.




The Nurturing Power of Nature





Heartland Bees

Introduction and History of the Gold Star:

The Gold Star Award is the highest achievement award given by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program through the county 4-H Program. The Texas 4-H Gold Star Award can only be awarded once in a member's 4-H career.

Requirements for the Texas 4-H Gold Star

- The member must have at **least completed their 9th grade school year** at the time of application, and must have completed at least 3 years in 4-H, including the current year.
- The Texas 4-H Gold Star Award can only be awarded once in a member's 4-H career.
- The 4-H member must have completed projects in at least three different project areas, submitted appropriate record forms, and have participated in one or more activities in at least three of the following areas:
 - * Projects and/or Project Exhibits
 - Participation in Leadership Experiences such as Leadership Labs, Texas 4-H Congress, o National Leadership Events such as National 4-H Congress/Conference, and any county, district, or state leadership group.
 - * Competitive Events (judging, educational presentation, public speaking, food show, quiz bowls, etc).
 - * Citizenship activities
 - * Camps at the county, district, or state level.
 - * 4-H Promotion (speeches, poster displays, radio, TV, newspapers)
 - * Other (includes exchange programs, fund raising)
 Note: The requirements for projects and activities do not all have to be completed in the current year. They may have been accomplished over the entire period of time the person has been in the program.
- The member must have exhibited leadership skills by serving as a 4-H officer or committee chair (club, county, district or state), and/or as a junior or teen leader in an activity or project with or under the supervision of an adult volunteer leader.
- The 4-H member must have participated in one or more community service activities. Examples include providing leadership to a One Day 4-H project, working with or counseling junior 4-H members; participating in community service projects (individual, group or club); and motivating other 4-H members through participation in demonstrations, projects and/or exhibits
- The 4-H member MUST SUBMIT A TEXAS 4-H RECORDBOOK in the year they are to be considered.
